Arizona ranks No. 12 across the nation for the number of dog-related claims reported in the state in 2015. A State Farm report indicates there were 90 Arizona claims related

to dog injuries reported to the company's agents in 2015, with claims costs of approximately \$5.7 million — an increase of seven claims from 2014, with an increase in cost that year of approximately \$3.4 million. As the costs for this type of loss mounts, several insurance carriers have limited the breeds they will cover or have

Photo enforcement is back

Three West Chandler intersections are among five locations where red light and excessive-speed camera tests are underway.

Passing motorists may see a flash of light but can breathe a sigh of relief — at least for now: The

cameras are going through a calibration and setup process through May 22.

Beginning May 23, however, speed demons and red-light runners will receive warnings in their mailbox.

The mailings will inform recipients that photo radar cameras at the designated intersections captured them in

a speed or red light violation. Motorists take note: On June 20, the warnings will cease and citations will be issued for both speeding and red light violations.

The West Chandler locations include Chandler Boulevard and Kyrene; McClintock Drive and Ray Road; and Chandler Boulevard and Dobson.

DANCING THE LIGHT FANTASTIC

Tapping into a craze revitalized from the days of early America

ance studio owner Mary Wall started developing her talent at the gawky age of 5, hoping to one day join the famed Rockettes in New York City. What she didn't know was that the renowned precision performers have a height requirement: Every one must be at least 5 feet 6 inches tall.

Small problem: During adolescence, Wall topped out at 5 foot 3.

"A dance teacher told my parents, 'She's not going to be a Rockette. They won't even audition her,'" Wall recalls. Her dream of a future in dance didn't end there though. She went on to college to major in theater arts, putting her dance moves to work in musicals.

Later, she spent years teaching dance at Mesa Community College and at Marilyn Bostic's Ballet Centre in south Tempe, as well as at other area colleges and venues.

All the while, said Wall, she dreamed of having her own studio. Two years ago, that dream became a reality when Wall to Wall Dance Center opened in Tempe.

"I love it. I can do what I want to do," Wall told Wrangler News. That means tapping her way to success, one class at a time. Some of the smaller classes have just three or four students; others boast 10 or 12. The studio is geared toward adults and offers lessons Monday through Friday.

"We take some teenagers, but I tell them up front, 'You've got to behave like an adult,'" Wall said. Many of her students are retirees, but the average age is 50-something. Her most senior student is 89, she said.

"It's a lot more fun than walking on a treadmill," Wall said of the physical benefits. "You



Drive away stress by vanpooling to work, says one who knows

The climbing temperatures that Tempe and West Chandler residents have come to expect this time of year do more than bring out the swimsuits and sunscreen.

They exact a toll on the tires, paint, upholstery and air conditioning units in vehicles.

For those with a significant commute to work, that toll can really add up. Valley Metro offers a way drivers can protect their vehicles and save both time and money.

With nearly 400 vanpools in operation, commuters are saving some 4.2 million drive-alone miles each month.

Marc Campbell, who lives in Chandler but works 20 miles away in Tempe, said he enjoys the benefits of the vanpool.

"With the increasing congestion here and throughout the area, I just enjoy not having the stress levels of driving in a single-occupant vehicle all the time," Campbell said.

"It's a much nicer ride. You get the opportunity to meet and talk with people and develop camaraderie and friendships you might not otherwise have."

Vanpools are available for groups of six to 15 people. One person volunteers to drive and passengers pay a monthly fare for gas, maintenance and insurance.

"I like the fact that I can reduce the wear and tear on my own vehicle; I can keep costs down and I'm also benefiting the environment," Campbell said.

"We're a pretty active van—there's a lot of conversation.

"There are times that folks withdraw into their own world and look at their phones and things like that, but for the most part we talk a lot, we laugh.

"We actually have a good time and I think that's probably why I enjoy it as well."

Valley Metro's Share the Ride program has 42,000 active users on the online free ride-matching system, where employees can connect with existing vanpool groups or start new ones.

New Chandler chief exec sees fiscal strength, planning as pathway to opportunity

handler's new city manager, Marsha Reed, doesn't need to wear rose-colored glasses to see that a positive future continues its ascent on the horizon.

In little more than 20 years, the once semi-rural community has been transformed into a magnet for sophisticated, high-tech industries and good-paying jobs that, in part, have attracted nearly 250,000 residents.

For Reed, Chandler is an emerging force in the Valley's economic, cultural and social evolution—a transition she

sees as not only a challenge but an opportunity.

Chandler officials confirmed Reed's appointment as the new city manager only a few weeks ago, succeeding Rich Dlugas, who retired in June.

She's been in the city's executive suite since April 2013, when she was hired as assistant city manager and, in short order, stepped up to become acting city manager while the search was underway.

During her trial period as Chandler's chief administrative officer, with responsibility for all city departments, Reed developed strong relationships with staff as well as the city's elected officials.

"My experience before being

appointed city manager allowed me to work with the mayor, council members and nearly every department, so I have knowledge about all aspects of the city organization," said Reed.

"I believe the opportunity to establish those relationships is a huge benefit in this position."

She appreciates the solid groundwork laid out before her, as Chandler is one of Arizona's first master-planned communities.

In that plan is a focus on investing in high-quality infrastructure, building livable neighborhoods, and creating distinct employment corridors with a balance of diverse industries.

Reed says her goals are to maintain a safe, livable community and, as the city approaches build-out, to make wise decisions with the remaining parcels of developable land.

"Fortunately, the mayor and council members have a shared vision for Chandler and that is significant advantage for me—along with the fact that we don't have council districts. This means that there's no animosity or competitiveness for allocations, so all the elected officials can give their full attention to working together to serve the good of the whole community," explained Reed.

"Also, our city staff is great; they work extremely well with each other and our residents to deliver highquality services and to resolve issues," said Reed.

Currently, a large priority is to rebuild the leadership team due to retirements and promotions.

"Chandler had the benefit of several long-time employees who were experts in their fields. With their departure, we are preparing employees and recruiting talent to take on leadership roles in the city. We look for people who embrace values that have made Chandler successful."

Another enviable position for city leadership is the opportunity to guide a municipality that is fiscally sound.

"We are in great fiscal shape with an AAA bond rating, which brings stability to Chandler, attracts companies with quality jobs and enables businesses to grow.

"It also may allow the council to actually lower the property tax rate





this year by two cents, which is a rare government occurrence," said Reed.

According to statistics from Chandler, the city provides residents great value in the total costs of their municipal services. Only Gilbert is slightly lower when compared to other Valley cities for water, property and sales tax.

Chandler is in another unique financial position as it relates to upcoming fiscal obligations for the fiscally challenged Public Safety Personnel Retirement System.

Each city is expected to contribute a specific percentage to its employees' pensions, but there is a special assessment looming due to the financial constraints of this fund.

"Chandler is currently the only city I have heard of that actually has a plan to pay its portion," explained Reed.

A Texas native, Reed shares some attributes with the city—she possessed great personal foresight when she chose her college major as engineering, determining she could use her skills in math to always make a living.

She earned a degree in civil engineering from Texas Tech University and held engineering and transportation-planning positions at the Texas Department of Transportation for 10 years in the Lubbock District.

Then, she accepted a position at the city of Lubbock, where she remained for 20 years, eventually serving as chief operating officer. It was during her tenure there that her supervisor identified her as a having leadership potential.

Reed's personal tenacity led her to earn a second degree from Texas Tech—a master's degree in Public Administration in 2000.

Additional professional credentials include being a licensed professional engineer in Arizona and Texas and being a current member of the Arizona City Managers Association and the Maricopa Association of Governments Management Committee.

Throughout her rise to positions with greater responsibility—and indeed no less a time commitment—Reed also managed to balance her career with a successful home life.

She is married to Brad Reed, a project manager for Maricopa County. They have four children, three grown and out of college, one in junior high.

She has one grandchild and another on the way. Also counted among family members: two Boston terriers.

Reed says that living in Chandler for the past three years has given her access to the many activities she enjoys in her leisure time, including the community's parks, restaurants, entertainment and other amenities.

"Chandler offers a great quality of life. I especially like the combination of recreation and mild climate. I also like being close to a number of hiking and destinations, which allows our family to enjoy the outdoors."

Legoland food court both tasty and local

It was 2007, nearly 10 years since Ward Walston had started awakening virtually every morning to confront another day, another construction site, another excruciating battle with the aches and pains that had grown progressively worse as the months and years wore on.

It was time, he told his wife Leslie, to find a new line of work to support

the family of four, now including two young sons needing a dad who was physically healthy, not increasingly immobilized by a compromised body.

So the pair talked about a new career for Ward and the possibility of moving from their home in the confines of tiny Salmon, Idaho, to a place with more job diversity, more potential, more opportunity to build their own version of the American Dream.

That's when the notion of opening a small, family-owned business became a topic of discussion, among many others, and the search was underway.

A friend had applied for a Great Harvest Bakery franchise in Idaho and had found the venture both successful and rewarding, so the Walstons figured a call to Great Harvest's corporate offices in Dillon, Montana, population 4,100, would be in order.

The negotiations that followed led to the couple's opening a Great Harvest satellite bakery in the upscale Countryside Specialty Shops complex on the northwest corner of Warner Road and McClintock Drive in Tempe.

Now, eight years into their enterprise, the Walstons have developed a cadre of customers who believe in, and go out of their way to support, the idea of healthy, fresh, affordable (did we mention delicious?) bread, rolls and pastries. Other franchises have come and gone, but none with the same quality products, friendly staff and family roots on which the Walstons have managed to build an enthusiastic and loyal following.

So it was no surprise when a couple of marketing department officials who

oversee Legoland—the showcase for a 21st Century remake of the wooden toys that originated in Denmark in 1932—asked the Walstons to stock their newest Arizona Mills location with a steady supply of home-baked sandwiches and snacks, all freshly made, all freshly delivered.

Still in the opening weeks of the west Tempe shopping-center location,

the Walstons are providing an assortment of Cobb, turkey and swiss, grilled cheese and other sandwiches, plus assorted snacks. Each order, broken down more or less equally between child and adult varieties, amounts to about 250 sandwiches, which the Walstons' son George dutifully delivers around 9 a.m. in specially packed coolers to ensure predictable quality.

Once delivered, the meals are packed into special Lego lunchboxes and placed in refrigerated cases to await the arrival of the hordes

of hungry customers.

While the added business hasn't yet necessitated an increase in the bakery's staffing, it has provided yet one more reason for the senior Walston to make sure he's on the job every day except Sunday by 2 a.m.

Again, though, the business' growth seems to have progressed just fine, thank you, the big Legoland order simply providing, you might say, frosting on the cake.

"Our customers, many of them winter visitors who are familiar with Great Harvest bakeries in other parts of the country, come from as far as Apache Junction, Sun City and Tucson because we're the only Great Harvest store in Arizona," says Walston.

Except, of course, until the bustling Lego wonderland opened its doors at Arizona Mills.

National concept's move to Tempe sparks new interest in music

ith all the understandable emphasis on Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics, or STEM, learning, there's an important facet of education that some worry might be getting overlooked: music.

Happily, that's not the case at Hovland Conservatory. A family-owned musical pursuit that spans four states has just opened its 12th location, this time in Tempe near U.S. 60 and Rural Road. Hovland, a non-profit organization that originated in 1989 in Minnesota, first came to Arizona 10 years ago. Mary Hovland founded the group, and her sons Peter and Andrew now help run the business.

Mary earned a degree in music and taught piano in a private school. After several years, she took a leap of faith and launched Hovland Conservatory.

"I saw there was a need for more structure and more curriculumbased lessons and how lessons are normally just sort of random," Mary said. "We have a set curriculum which is unlike anybody else." Normally, if a parent wants a child to receive piano lessons, there's a whole process of finding and interviewing teachers. Each teacher then decides what they're going to do. Hovland operates differently.

"We have like 200 third graders," Mary said. "Every third grader is doing the same lesson this week, just like they are doing the same lesson in school." With some 1,200 students spread throughout Hovland's 12 locations, it's an organized way to keep students moving forward and learning music.

They've had their share of success stories through the years.

One former Hovland student won the talent portion of the Miss Teen America pageant. Others have gone on to become music teachers themselves.

"I have a student who's a medical doctor who told me when I went to her graduation, 'I don't think I could have been a medical doctor if it wasn't for my musical education.' I said, 'That's a big statement, but I'll take it.'"

Mary said she thinks music lessons help spark learning,





particularly when they begin early in life.

"When you start them in kindergarten, it's almost phenomenal how much smarter they become," Mary said. "They are interacting with a teacher, answering questions and they're moving from learning in a spontaneous way to learning in an organized way."

And while "everybody loves music," she said, not very many people know how to read it fluently. That's why Hovland strives to reach out to more children to instill the discipline and joy of music. The results are encouraging.

"The kids who have ADHD, autistic kids, kids who have trouble at school, those are the ones that we can help," Mary said.

"Music really helps them in a way that I don't know anything else can. We have a lot of kids who come with motor skill problems. We can work with them, so those are huge success stories to me."

Peter said one way Hovland is encouraging students to try music lessons is through its Budding Musician scholarship program.

"They can try two lessons for free without any obligation to continue," Peter said. "Not a lot of families are doing music lessons. So our push as a non-profit is to get kids exposed to trying a piano lesson with the hope they'll continue on."

The one-on-one lessons are taught by one of Hovland's 40 teachers who guide students through a grade-based curriculum. For those students who don't begin in kindergarten, there are also classes geared toward various levels of learning.

WEB, 'Where everyone belongs'

The growing nationwide program adopted at Kyrene middle schools says it all: We're a place "Where Everyone Belongs."

WEB, the acronym by which it's known in schools across the country, is built on the belief that older students can help younger ones succeed in the transition from elementary to middle school.

It's a way for selected eighth graders to act as mentors to incoming sixth-grade students.

The new mentors connect with their assigned sixth grader for the entire year to help build a strong positive relationship and to help the new kids overcome any adjustment issues to attendance in middle school.

The Kyrene Foundation provided an annual \$5,000 Principal's Grant, which was given to Jocelyn Sims, principal at Centennial Middle School. Simms chose to use the grant as seed money for teachers to be trained on how to start and implement WEB.

In the 2015-16 school year the WEB peer mentoring, transition and orientation program was introduced at Centennial.

When classes began, incoming sixth graders spent the first day with their eighth-grade mentors. They maintained their relationship with these mentors throughout the school year through informal interactions as well as formal activities.

Due to the positive reactions of students, teachers and parents, the Kyrene Foundation then applied for a Tempe Diablos grant to take the program to the other five Kyrene middle schools.

With continued support from the foundation, the Tempe Diablos have pledged \$39,000 for the upcoming school year along with district funds to support expanding WEB to all middle schools in the district by the 2017-2018 school year, according to Nancy Dudenhoefer,

assistant manager of Community Relations for the Kyrene District.

"In the fall, the WEB program will be launched at Kyrene, Aprende and Aikemel A-al middle schools for 2016-17," said Dudenhoefer.

"And, in the last year of the three-year rollout out, it will be introduced at Pueblo and Altadeña."

At Kyrene Middle School, the program's facilitator is Nicole Woley, a sixth-grade math teacher, who was trained to be a WEB facilitator, along with Sarah Sottile, KMS dean of students.

"Academic studies show if students have a positive experience their first year in middle school, their chances for success increase dramatically," said Sottile.

"WEB provides the structure for sixth graders to receive support and guidance from eighth graders who have been through the challenges that

No cause for alarm here, but Zika worries could grow

n the heels of the first Zika virus-related death in the U.S., growing concern about the Summer Olympic Games to be held in Rio de Janeiro this August and a newly announced \$1.1 billion commitment to combat the disease, a Tempe physician offered his thoughts on how the virus is transmitted and what the risks could be for local residents

Rio has approximately 26,000 suspected cases of the virus, but it's also 6,000 miles away from Tempe and West Chandler—in other words, a day's journey by jet.


Dr. Zaheer A. Shaw, a primary care physician in Tempe, said that, nevertheless, generally speaking, the Zika virus is not an "imminent concern" for his patients.

Still, he said, "I would be very concerned about a patient of mine who is traveling into an area where this virus is endemic. I would also be concerned about a female patient who is the sexual partner of someone who is traveling into these endemic areas."

Typically, the infection is transmitted to people through the bite of an infected mosquito, but it can also be sexually transmitted from person-to-person.

"Anyone who has been infected with the virus and their sexual partners should practice various forms of safer sex, especially by using condoms correctly and consistently," Dr. Shah noted.

"The sexual partner of a pregnant woman who is either living in or returning from an area where the Zika virus is endemic should practice safer sex by wearing condoms or abstaining from sexual activity



throughout the pregnancy."

Symptoms of the Zika virus include fever, skin rashes, conjunctivitis, muscle and joint pain, malaise, and headache.

These symptoms can be quite mild the last only for a few days up to one week.

Physicians are often able to make a diagnosis of the Zika viral infection based on the patient's signs and symptoms as well the recent travel history to an area where the virus is spreading.

There's also a laboratory test available that can confirm the presence of virus RNA in the blood or other body fluids such as urine or saliva.

One of the major concerns that has been raised is the risk to the unborn child.

The CDC has recently published a comprehensive report that has causally connected the Zika virus with microcephaly and other severe fetal brain defects in children born to a woman who was infected with the virus during the pregnancy.

"The CDC has also continued its recommendation that pregnant women should avoid traveling to areas where the Zika virus is known to be active," Dr. Shah said.

"I want to be clear: that this does not mean that every baby born to a pregnant woman who has been infected with Zika virus will have severe brain defects or microcephaly, but just that there is a increased risk of such in that scenario."

The other concern with the Zika virus is that it can lead to serious neurological complications such as like Guillain-Barre syndrome.

"There have also been several cases of documented serious neurological complications in infected Americans. Fortunately, so far Arizona seems to have dodged such tragedies," Dr. Shah said.

Although Tempe and West Chandler are not known as having rampant mosquito activity, the type of mosquito that transmits the Zika virus has been in Maricopa County for years.

According to the Arizona Department of Health Services, so far there is no evidence of the virus being transmitted by mosquitoes in the state. Nevertheless, residents are urged to be vigilant about mosquito control by eliminating standing water and maintaining pools and ponds on their property. Details are available by calling Maricopa County Vector Control at 602-506-6616.

Corona's Nero calls Nenaber a great choice to succeed him in A.D. job

ory Nenaber will most likely be Corona's new athletic director, awaiting approval by the Tempe Union High School District governing board, after long-time athletic director **Dan Nero** announced his retirement to be effective at the end of the school year.

Nenaber had just started coaching spring football practice when he accepted the offer to take over and succeed Nero, who has been at the school for 31 years, 20 of which were spent in the front office as assistant

principal of athletics.

"I spent my first 11 years as a math teacher and football, track and basketball coach," said Nero.

When asked why he decided to retire, Nero cited personal reasons, especially family.

"Our youngest son, Luke, is graduating and the time just seemed right," said Nero. "I plan on spending time with my wife Meg and our family, including our grandkids Max and Lily."

Nero believes Nenaber is a great choice to replace him as athletic director

"Coach Nenaber is an Aztec grad who 'bleeds orange,' and really cares about kids," said Nero. "He knows what it takes to make Corona among the best in the state."

Needless to say, Nenaber is thrilled to get the chance.

"I am very excited to become the new Athletic Director at Corona," said Nenabei

"I always thought about moving into this position someday, I just didn't realize it would happen so quickly."

"I think this is a great opportunity for me to be able to impact all student athletes in a positive way and provide direction for the Athletic Department in the future."

Nenaber, who returned to his alma mater two years ago to revitalize Corona's football program, was starting to make headway as evidenced by the Aztecs making it into the DII state football playoffs last fall.

Nenaber's first undertaking as athletic director, with Nero's help, was going to be helping to find his own replacement on the football field. (For how that process unfolded, see related story on Page 13).

Corona Girls Sand Volleyball

— Corona was one of the 18 schools to participate in DI girls sand volleyball in its inaugural season as an Arizona high school sport this spring. Seven schools participated in DII.

Corona was also the only school from the Tempe Union High School district to field a team.

Sand volleyball at the high school level its quite different from the indoor game.

In sand volleyball, it's two players versus two opposing players on the other side of the net for each of five matches.

It's similar to high school badminton or tennis in that when competing against another school, the team that wins three or more of the five matches wins the overall match.

"For instance, at Corona, we had 18 girls on the roster but only five pairs and one alternative pair suited up for a match," said Coach **Ben Maxfield.**"The girls played challenge matches to earn their way onto the team for the upcoming match."

Corona had a rough start to the season, losing three out of their first four matches, with players new to the sport playing against some more experienced teams, but started to catch on midway through the season, according to Maxfield.

Part of the problem is that most of the girls only had experience playing indoors. "In sand volleyball you have to develop all your skills—you need to be able to pass, set, hit, play defense, serve, etc.," said Maxfield. "In indoor volleyball, it is way more position-specific, thus you might find some players who can't pass very well but they don't have to do it indoors."

The Aztecs improved and finished the season strong.

"The girls worked hard to learn this new sport and we ended up winning five of our last six matches," said Maxfield. "This experience will make them even better indoor players this fall."

Some of the best players initially were outside hitters who usually have to play all the way around indoors and have to be able to pass, block, hit and serve.

"Our best blockers and attackers were our outside hitters from indoor," said Maxfield. "Erica Ronda, Brooke Nuneviller, Desi Rodriguez, Brooke O'Meara, Allie Wade, Emily Stellburg and Kelly Warren were all quite good offensively and at blocking."

"Our best defensive digging players on the team were **Lexi Vlcek**, Brooke Nuneviller, Erica Ronda and Brooke O'Meara," said Maxfield. "As far as serving, **Jill Cota** had a wicked, awesome serve and Erica had a tough jump serve."

All in all, Coach Maxfield feels pretty good about how the Aztecs first season turned out.

"We improved tremendously from the beginning to the end of the season, finishing fifth at the state tournament," said Maxfield. "We look forward to continuing to build a strong sand program that consistently competes for state championships."

Corona Baseball — The last thing the Aztecs expected, after being ranked No. 4 both in the state and in Division I with a 21-6 record and a bye in the first round of the 2016 AIA State

Baseball Championships, was to be ousted in their first game of the post season at home against No. 14 ranked Chaparral on May 3.

Chaparral survived the first round, defeating No. 19 Sunnyslope by one point, 6-5, on April 30.

In the second and last round before the tournament became double elimination, Chaparral hung on to pull out a win by one point, 12-11, against Corona but in a much higher scoring game than the Firebird first round win.

The Aztecs went up 4-2 in the first inning, but the Firebirds stormed back to tie the game 4-4 in the second inning.

The Aztecs went up again by 2 at 6-4 in the third inning but could not hold on to the lead when the Firebirds scored eight runs to Corona's two in the fifth inning.

The Aztecs fought back, scoring two runs in the sixth and one in the seventh inning but ran out of innings before they could get enough runs to catch the Firebirds.

It was an exciting game that was the end to a great season for the Aztecs and an especially poignant one for the seven seniors on the team who were honored at the team's last home game April 25.

"Overall, this is one of the greatest collection of seniors I have ever coached," said head coach **Dave**Webb. "These seven seniors are not just great baseball players; they are truly phenomenal human beings. I could not be more proud of them."

Three of these seniors, **Ryan Novis**, **Connor McCord** and **Price Barrett**, were the leading batters on the team, hitting .468, .400 and .357 respectively over the season.

Ryan Novis scored 44 runs and 33 RBI's and hit three homeruns his senior season. He was second to junior **Chase Hamilton** in stolen bases with 13 while Hamilton had 16.

"Ryan, pound for pound, is the best hitter in the state," said Webb. "He's a kid that plays unbelievably hard. He has a really bright future."

Connor McCord was not only a leading batter for the Aztecs scoring 19 runs on 32 hits with 28 RBI's and five homeruns, he led the team in putouts with 134 putouts on 151 chances.

To top that off, McCord started as pitcher seven times pitching over 40 innings and was credited with 35 strikeouts and five wins.

"Connor, a varsity player for three years, is a great team leader on the field and in the dugout," said Webb. "We will miss his outstanding hitting and pitching, especially during clutch situations."

Price Barrett was third on the team in hitting percentage where he earned 15 runs on 16 hits playing in 21 games.

Austin Treese, one of Corona's 10 pitchers, made six appearances with two starts and a 4.58 ERA for the season.

"Austin is one of the greatest team players I have ever been around," said Webb. "He is one of the most selfless human beings that you could find."

Liam Stills played in all 27 games hitting .351 scoring 27 runs.

"Liam will be heading off to West Point after graduating this month and rightfully so," said Webb.

"I feel safer as an American citizen know that soldiers like Liam are serving us."

Cuellar played in 18 games hitting .300 while scoring 13 runs while Minder played in 25 games scoring 11 runs.

"Josh Cuellar is a scrappy little player who really came into his own to help us his senior season," said Webb. "He's a great kid to be around and his attitude is infectious."

"**David Minder** battled through adversity this season but came up big for our team many times," said Webb

Corona should return 15 players next season from this year's very successful team including junior catcher **Gehrig Sanchez** who was credited with 122 putouts on 125 chances and junior pitcher **Gordon Bracy** and freshman pitcher **Daniel Sotelo**.

Bracy started as pitcher eight times pitching in 38 innings where he was credited with six wins and only two loses and an ERA of 4.24. Sotelo also started eight times and is credited with seven wins.

Several juniors, including **Jacob Goodwin**, Hamilton, Sanchez, **Jacob Clemens** and sophomore **Matt Novis**, gained valuable playing experience by each playing in over 20 of the 28 games this season which should bode well experience wise for next season.

Tempe Baseball — The Buffaloes finished the season 18-16-1 after honoring their nine seniors at the last home game. These nine seniors made up almost two-thirds of the team this season and will be sorely missed.

Ezra Johnson, Joey Matus, Rui Fusato, Silas Sprout, Zach Mitchell, Brock Williams, **Phillip Valencia**, **Joeseph Dixon** and **Charlie Cano** are the nine seniors who participated on and off the field for Tempe.

Fusato led the seniors in batting percentage at .338 followed by Johnson at .327, Mitchell at .296, Cano at .281 and Valencia at .245.

Mitchell, Cano and Matus, three of the eight pitchers on the roster played significant roles on the team with Mitchell pitching over 50 innings followed by Cano at over 33 innings and Matus over 14.

Williams, who played catcher all 25 games, caught and put our over 20 opposing players trying to steal base.

Grad's inspiration paves road to West Point future

It's a crazy world we live in nowadays. With so much unrest in many different parts of the globe, there are a number of ways people can respond to it.

But there probably aren't many people who look at the issues we face like Liam Stills. Stills, who

graduated from Corona del Sol High School on May 19, said the turmoil overseas and in the US inspires him to change to world.

"I was relieved for sure," Stills said. "That was the main thing I was worried about because that's one of the hardest things to get and you need a nomination to get an appointment, so when I got that I knew I had a very real chance of getting into the academy after

Just days after his high school graduation, Stills' path is pretty well carved out. He's hoping to leave West Point not only with the military experience he craves, but with a degree in either business

management or economics as well.

"I'm both excited and nervous," Stills said. "It's going to be hard, but it's going to be good for me."



Angry Birds: Tweeting a poor message to young audiences?

The Angry Birds franchise began in 2009 as a video game, the object of which was to launch roly-poly little birds from a slingshot at little green pigs. The pigs have stolen their eggs, you see. The game led to more than a dozen spin-off games, and merchandising ranging from toys to clothes to TV cartoons, and now, inevitably, to this animated feature.

Our hero, voiced by Jason Sudeikis, is Red, the scowling, cardinal-like bird you've been seeing on kids' hats and t-shirts the last few years, if you've been paying attention. He lives on an island inhabited by oddly flightless avians—it's the entire Universe, as far as they know. Most of these birds aren't inordinately angry, so an outburst, early on, lands Red in court, and he's sent to an anger management class, where he meets other...well, you know.

Then huge ships arrive filled with green pigs. The guileless birds are taken in by their friendly overtures, except for Red, who's suspicious of them. He turns out to be right, of course. The pigs steal the island's eggs, and it's up to Red and his anger management classmates to rouse the ire of the populace, and lead them to the land of the pigs to try to rescue them from the Pig King's kettle.

The high-ticket voice cast, which includes the likes of Josh Gad, Danny McBride, Bill Hader, Maya Rudolph, Peter Dinklage and even Sean Penn—amusingly cast as the Angriest of the Birds—more or less ensures that there will be a few laughs. There's some ingenious visual shtick, too. But overall *The Angry Birds Movie* is tiring—too many of the gags and situations seem artificially extended, as if the filmmakers knew they didn't have much story to work with, and were trying to pad for time.

More than this, there's the whole matter of the theme of anger. Anger is funny. Most comedy is based on some degree of anger. Anger also resonates with children, who feel it intensely but in most cases impotently.

But there's anger and then there's anger. There's legitimate, mature outrage at, say, rudeness or injustice, and then there's the anger that can arise from annoyance at other people's cheerfulness, or from changes in our world with which we're uncomfortable, or simply from daily inconveniences.

We're all subject to this second sort, of course, and it's always a good source of comedy. But it shouldn't be mistaken for wisdom, and I fear that's how *The Angry Birds Movie* wants us to see it. I certainly don't think the film is intentionally reactionary, but I'm also unconvinced that a celebration of anger—resolving itself in war on foreigners—is what our society is most in need of just now. We have plenty of angry birdbrains already.

The Angry Birds Movie is rated PG and plays at Harkins Tempe Marketplace 16, Arizona Mills 25, Chandler Fashion 20 and other multiplexes Valleywide.

Advice for keeping electricity usage in check during Valley's summer months Some ways you've thought of, plus some you likely haven't

s temperatures continue to climb and Tempe and West Chandler residents gear up for summer fun, there's one thing most are not looking forward to: a dramatic spike in their electric bill.

Kathleen Mascareñas, media relations specialist with Salt River Project, offered pointers on how to keep the summer electric bills from gobbling up the family budget.

"The number one energy consumer in your home is your air conditioning unit," Mascareñas told Wrangler News. Reducing the use of the unit is one surefire way to lower energy consumption, she said.

"We recommend that you set your thermostat between 78 to 80 degrees when you're home, and when you're away from your home, you set the thermostat at about 85 degrees."

With every degree set above 80, consumers can save about 2 to 3 percent on cooling costs. An easy way to achieve that is through a programmable thermostat, Mascareñas said.

"You can set it and forget it."

There are also some low-tech solutions to reducing energy consumption: keeping the blinds, shutters and curtains closed during the hottest part of the day.

Windows can account for nearly 50 percent of the heat that enters a home. SRP also offers rebates to homeowners who install shade screens on their windows.

For those interested in green solutions, Mascareñas said planting shade trees can help keep costs down. SRP offers two free shade trees to



homeowners who take a class and learn how to properly plant them. Once fully grown, the trees can reduce a homeowner's electric bill by up to \$50 per year.

When it comes to the kitchen, old standby tricks like the use of a slow cooker can really add up to savings.

"Anything you can do to not heat up your home. We all know that when oven or stove is going, you can feel the warmth inside the home. So we do recommend grilling outdoors or preparing meals that do not require the range or the stove," Mascareñas said.

She also pointed to ceiling fans and the need to reverse the blades during the spring and summer months. "A lot of people forget to rotate them. You also want to

make sure you turn the fans off when you leave the room because ceiling fans don't actually cool the room—they just cool the body while you're in that room."

Then there are what SRP refers to as the "top 10 bad energy wasting habits" that drive bills higher.

Like standing in front of the refrigerator with the door open, pondering the contents.

"I would say, be aware of what you want, go in and get it and get out. Don't linger there," Mascareñas said.

Using old-fashioned incandescent bulbs and falling asleep with the television on are two other ways energy is wasted.

The other no-no is leaving appliances plugged in when they are not being used.


"We call those energy vampires," Mascareñas noted. That includes the cell phone that's already fully charged but still plugged in and those entertainment devices.

"Leaving all the X-Boxes and Gameboys plugged in all the time also adds up in that bill for you."


The proposed location for the new station, to be known as Station 7, is the southwest corner of Estrada Park, near the intersection of McClintock Drive and Warner Road.

Join dedication of new **Veterans Memorial**

Temorial Day, Monday, May 30, will be **IVI** extra special this year as the community comes together at 8 a.m. to dedicate the first phase of Chandler's Field of Honor Veterans Memorial located on the northeast corner of Chandler Heights and Lindsay roads. Area veterans and residents are encouraged to attend.

The memorial has been years in the making as donations have been sought to fund the design and construction of the project. Workshops were held with veterans to develop the concept of the memorial with the goal of providing a space for remembrance and reflection. Construction of the initial phase was funded in large part by a \$500,000 donation from the Gila River Indian Community, in addition to \$173,000 in private donations and some City funds.



"This permanent memorial honors the dedication and love of country shown by all those patriots from the Southeast Valley who have served in the armed forces," Mayor

Jay Tibshraeny said. "It is a place where individuals, families and groups of various sizes can express their love and appreciation for our veterans."

The completed first phase includes a family plaza overlook that replicates the Arizona State Flag and features low walls with inscriptions recognizing six core values significant to veterans and their families: Freedom, Reflection, Recognition, Sacrifice, Family and Memories. A donor recognition area and parking lot also are included.

As additional funds are available, remaining phases will include the construction of rows of pillars that replicate the U.S. Flag in an open field.

The dedication ceremony will include remarks by Mayor Jay Tibshraeny, music by the Chandler Fire, Health & Medical Department Pipes & Drums Corps, Posting of Colors by the Gila River Pee Posh Veterans Association and Pledge of Allegiance by retired Lt. Colonel David Althoff, a Chandler resident and pilot who served in Korea, Japan and Vietnam, earning 76 medals and decorations. The invocation will be led by local pastor and Air Force veteran Dr. Michael D. Sproul.

The memorial is part of the 113-acre Veterans Oasis Park that includes a stocked urban fishing lake surrounded by walking trails, picnic areas and play areas for kids. The park also features an Environmental Education Center (EEC) that has classrooms, a nature discovery room, exhibit areas and a nature store.

Popular Mexican restaurant expands to second location

wo years ago, Eduardo Chavez dreamed of offering the same kind of authentic Mexican food that has been a lifelong mainstay of his cultural heritage. And thus was born La Casa de Juana, a brightly decorated tribute to the cuisine—and the history—of Chavez's native country, home of our south-of-the-border gastronomic inspiration.

Fast forward to 2016: Chavez's Tempe location, settled into the busy Pollack Cinemas center, has flourished and, within the last month, has expanded into southwest Mesa.

Specializing in authentic Mexican platters with, as Chavez describes it, a "motherly" touch, La Casa de Juana seems to have found a perfect home. Patrons can enjoy the restaurant's salsa, which is prepared from scratch, and indulge in a Mexican Fiesta Platter that offers a combination of tacos, enchiladas, tamales, tostadas, etc.

"When people stop by we want to create an atmosphere so that they feel at home," Chavez said. "The meaning of our name is home, and that's what we try to offer here."

In addition, the restaurant offers breakfast, lunch and dinner options such as huevos con enchiladas, steak ranchero and shrimp ceviche tostadas.

There are also vegetarian plates to choose from, such as veggie tacos, Mexican veggie sopas and veggie tostadas.

"Our recipes come from dedication, time and the love that comes with making a dish, and that to me is authentic," he said. "We strive for all our dishes to have a sense of being prepared in a Mexican home."

The décor of the restaurant consists of vibrant and colorful furniture, painting and sculptures that capture the essence Mexican culture.

Expanding La Casa de Juana was always in back of Chavez's mind, but he was focused on doing it the right way, he said.

That meant never losing sight of the restaurant's fundamental commitment of providing each patron with Mexican cuisine and a friendly, family atmosphere.

"We want to keep our identity as a small business

and continue to grow. We don't ever want to lose our identity or the way we prepare all of our food because that's what our customers expect from us."

Chavez said he was a bit leery about expanding into Mesa, considering the city has experienced a bit of an economic downturn in recent years.

However, he's confident Mesa will garner positive economic acceleration within the coming years.

"I like to think about the possibilities of the good that's to come for La Casa de Juana being in Mesa," he said. "I think in the past Mesa has been an excellent place for restaurants to flourish. I

see potential here for us."

Construction in the area is currently being completed in front of the store and elsewhere along Southern Avenue. The fact that business has been affected (considering the restaurant opened in mid-April) has been somewhat disappointing, but Chavez isn't complaining. He was told it wouldn't be completed until July.

Nor did road construction, barricades, prohibited turns and general disarray seem to bother the crowd on a recent Friday, when virtually every table in the place was filled.

Chavez said the past two years have been a success not only due

La Casa de Juana's food, but by the restaurant's loyal customer base.

"When you are doing things with dedication, people are going to sense that and they appreciate it," he said.

"That's what we have strived for at the Tempe location, and will continue to do in Mesa."

La Casa de Juana's new location is located at 1976 W. Southern Ave., in Mesa. The Tempe location is in the Pollack Tempe Cinema Center, southeast corner of Elliot Road and McClintock Avenue.

middle school poses and understand that the transition to a larger school can sometimes be overwhelming."

When KMS resumes classes in the fall, each Wednesday, both the eighth-grade mentors and sixth graders will attend a class together, which will be considered an exploratory credit.

The sixth graders will experience at least eight positive contacts with WEB leaders during the first six weeks of school, which should contribute

to overall school safety as well as help to create a sense of connection.

The KMS classes will include structured activities and lessons, according to Woley, who recently led the seventh graders selected as mentors in their first round of training—where they sprawled across the gym floor to complete an activity.

Working quietly and in randomly chosen groups, the diverse group of seventh graders in the training session appeared to be focused on the task at hand. Since they had to apply become mentors, the kids already demonstrated a strong desire to assist their fellow students.

WEB also will act as an anti-bullying program for KMS by providing it with a cadre of student leaders who look for bullying behavior and help stop it.

WEB gives older students permission to be aware of and report any negative behavior they see, creating a safer school for everybody.

But, the biggest benefit for students, who become involved in WEB, is learning that people at school care about them and their success says Dudenhoefer.

"The district sees great value in this initiative and appreciates the grant donations to implement it in all our middle schools."

are getting wonderful physical activity and you're having a good time with it, too."

Liisa Walimaa has been taking tap dancing lessons from Wall for three years.

"Tap is fantastic. It is something anyone can do," Walimaa said. "It's just plain fun."

Walimaa said she dances other styles too, but those all require partners. "Tap is a great way for me to be able to dance without a partner—to tap into that creativity on my own," she added.

Wall oversees two performance groups that convene at the studio. One is for students over 50, another is an evening group for working people who can't meet during the day. They recently performed at Mesa Community College to raise money for their dance scholarship fund and shortly afterward participated in a charity event to support a group that's going to Peru this summer to build a school.

The performance groups have tapped their way into the hearts of nursing home residents with performances there, too, and once auditioned for the hit television series, America's Got Talent.

"I also get a lot of theater people who are preparing," Wall said. "They've got a

removed this aspect of liability coverage altogether as an exclusion.

State Farm recently released its annual dog-injury statistics to help keep the problem at the forefront for dog owners and as a reminder to the non-dog-owning public to stay alert.

According to State Farm figures, the amount paid for dog bite claims in Arizona and the average cost for those claims is dependent on many factors.

Studies show that dog-related injuries (keep in mind that not all claims are for actual dog bites but involve mishaps resulting from broken bones, as when a dog jumps on you and you fall down) may also include injuries while running from a dog and other types of unanticipated incidents.

There may be higher expenses due to lawsuits as well. It has nothing to do with pit bulls because State Farm doesn't track the breed of dog involved in bites or injuries but it may be that people in Arizona are having more severe injuries because of interactions with dogs.

Mary Contreras of Contreras State Farm Agency advises that you check your policy to confirm if your homeowners or renters insurance covers dog-related claims.

Another aspect of the issue is that

in 2015, 86 postal carriers were bitten by dogs. When a dog bites a postal worker, the homeowner insurance company still pays for that bite...and more.

An article in The Insurance Journal noted that the average cost of a dogbite claim in 2015 was a staggering \$37,214.

The Insurance Journal went on to explain that Arizona's dog bite statute holds that a dog owner is strictly liable for any injury or property damage caused by the dog, even if done without provocation.

A postal carrier who is bitten by a dog has the injury initially paid through worker's comp but, depending on the severity of the attack, the Postal Service may seek reimbursement for the postal carriers' medical expenses through the homeowner insurance company.

In addition, the insurance company also pays for any time the postal carrier missed work and the salary for the back-up postal carrier to work the mail route.

Total dog injuries to USPS letter carriers in Arizona (2014) – 64; Total dog injuries to USPS letter carriers in Arizona (2015) – 86; Increase in dog injuries to USPS letter carriers in Arizona (2014 to 2015) – 22 bites or 34.38 percent.

Discerning Diner

Summer has arrived, time for potato salad's welcome return

Editor's note: As mentioned in previous issues, we frequently hear from readers who miss the musings of our longtime—and now, unfortunately, former—Discerning Diner, who several years ago moved on to loftier goals. Since then, however, especially as certain seasonal occasions arise, we happily reprint the columns that were so eagerly anticipated and now have become so universally missed.

▼ ummer weekends are upon us, and to most of us that means two things: pools and potato salad. The pools are obvious. As for potato salad, well, one way or another, my outdoor dining adventures always have included it, whether I'm out on a picnic or at home by the

It's a summertime tradition, and not one I'm inclined to

Now, potato salad is something that people feel strongly about. I'm pretty sure you have a favorite picnic potato salad recipe, and I'm not going to tell you how to make it.

Instead, I'm going to talk about a different kind of potato salad: the warm kind. It's not a replacement for the cold, creamy stuff you pack on picnics, but pretty scrumptious nonetheless.

My interest in warm potato salads is primarily due to my husband, who, among his many quirks, professes to hate cold potatoes in any form.

Without conceding his point—I love cold potato salad-I will say that, yeah, the starchy texture of potatoes is typically better hot.

Warm potato salads are also convenient if you forget to make the cold stuff ahead (and that's the real reason I make them so often).

Warm or cold, the best choice for salad is red-skinned new potatoes, which hold up well to boiling. Baking potatoes, like Russets, will tend to mush and fall apart.

For my warm potato salad, I borrow a tip from Cook's Illustrated, which recommends slicing the potatoes before cooking them. Not only will the pretty red skins adhere all the better, you'll cut down on cooking time and avoid having to handle the proverbial hot potato.

So: For a family of four hungry potato-salad eaters, thoroughly scrub two pounds of small new potatoes and slice into rounds about 1/4-inch thick.

Put the potatoes in a pot, cover them with plenty of cold water, add one tablespoon of salt, and bring the whole thing to a boil over high heat. Reduce to a brisk simmer and cook the potatoes until tender but not soft, five or 10

You can probably tell that the potatoes are done just by poking at them. But if you'd like to bite into a slice, spear it with a fork and run it under cold water first, to avoid burning your mouth. (Not that I've ever done that before.)

When the potatoes are done, drain them well. Carefully transfer the slices directly to a serving bowl.

So much for the potatoes. Now for the dressing, vinaigrette, which you make while the potatoes are cooking.

Here's the basic formula: one to three teaspoons of Dijon mustard (depending on how mustardy you like it) whisked with two tablespoons of red or white wine vinegar and five tablespoons of best-quality olive oil. A fine rendering of the mustard, by the way, can be purchased in 8-ounce quantities from that provider of all-things delicious, Great Harvest Bakery, for approximately \$7.50. Call the bakery at 480-777-1141.

Some freshly ground black pepper and 1/4 teaspoon salt is a good idea, too.

When the potatoes are just barely cool enough to handle, drizzle the vinaigrette over them and, with clean hands, toss gently to combine. Salt the potatoes to taste.

If you're adding extras, toss them in at the same time. Fresh herbs are always in order: chopped fresh parsley, chives, tarragon and/or thyme.

So are alliums, i.e., the onion family. Add finely chopped shallots, sliced scallions or even sliced green garlic (if you can find it) directly to the salad.

Or, finely chop 1/4 of a red onion and soak it in two tablespoons of wine vinegar, mixed with ½ teaspoon sugar, for 10 minutes. Substitute this mixture for the vinegar in your dressing.

And if you're feeling adventurous, try mixing in some chopped, oil-cured black olives and oil-packed sun-dried tomatoes. Garnish with slices of freshly hard-boiled egg.

It's not your mother's potato salad but then, it's not supposed to be.
